2019-20 Highlights

Committed over \$35,000 in grants through the Yukon Heritage Training Fund

The long-term capacity of the Yukon heritage sector grew through 18 training projects benefitting 40 participants.

Planned and hosted a major international conference

The Our Trails Bring Us Together / Haa deiyí wóoshxh haa ła.ât / Łàch'i tän kwaäga dūjal du Conference attracted nearly 200 attendees from Canada and the United States and marked the 150th anniversary of the Kohklux maps.

Secured the loan of the original Kohklux and Kandik maps

With the assistance of several partners, YHMA arranged for the loan of the original small Kohklux and Kandik maps, which were displayed at the Da Kų and Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centres and available for public viewing.

Fostered student learning through the Yukon/Stikine Regional Heritage Fair

32 student projects wowed judges at the 21st annual fair, attended by over 100 students, teachers, volunteer judges, dignitaries, and guests.

Recognized achievement through the 2019 Heritage Awards

John Firth, Helene Dobrowolsky, Ron Ingram, Lillian Nakamura Maguire, Gwaandak Theatre, and Vuntut Gwitchin Government received awards for their contributions to Yukon heritage.

Advocated for Yukon's heritage and heritage community

YHMA was active regarding a variety of advocacy issues relating to the Yukon heritage community, including the early impacts of COVID-19.

Strengthened the Yukon heritage community network

Through communication tools like our website and e-bulletin, YHMA reinforced the network that connects the Yukon heritage community with Yukoners, visitors, and the global heritage community.

Raised awareness and knowledge of the Yukon's heritage

Through activities and public events, YHMA worked to raise awareness and knowledge of the special places, stories, and groups that contribute to the Yukon's rich and diverse heritage.

Supported initiatives to protect and celebrate Yukon heritage

Committees

Membership Committee: This committee is responsible for monitoring member satisfaction and reviewing YHMA's membership program.

The Yukon Historical & Museums Association was established in 1977 by a group of concerned and passionate individuals to create a united voice for understanding and promoting heritage and history in the Yukon. Today, YHMA is a territorially-incorporated Society and a registered charitable organization whose membership reflects the scope and diversity of the Yukon heritage community, comprising heritage organizations, heritage sector workers, and others actively involved in the heritage sector or who have an interest in heritage.

Strengthening YHMA, Strengthening Community

YHMA serves to connect, engage, and share information among members of the Yukon heritage sector, and to raise awareness of and support for the territory's unique and diverse heritage. No easy feat for a community scattered across over 480,000 km²!

Over the past year, YHMA has undertaken a wide variety of activities aimed at strengthening the organization and improving our ability to support Yukon heritage and the heritage community.

We did this in a number of ways:

Hosted an international conference to mark the 150th anniversary of the Kohklux maps in partnership with the Jilkaat Kwaan Heritage Center and Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centre, bringing together over 50 presenters and 130 additional attendees from Canada and the United States.

Growing an Audience

- Produced a travelling exhibition on the Kohklux and Kandik maps in connection with the conference, now available for rental.
- Worked with our partners to secure the loan of the original small Kohklux and Kandik maps from The Bancroft Library in California.
- Assisted heritage professionals, organizations, and members of the public in finding contacts and resources, both financial and informational, for their heritage-related projects.
- Conducted our first annual stakeholder survey to identify advocacy priorities and ways to improve our programs and services.
- Continued to deliver our core programs and services, advocate on behalf of Yukon heritage, share timely heritage news and information, and maintain our national and territorial networks.
- Ran a series of vintage, antiques, and collectibles sales and community garbage clean ups as fundraisers, forging new connections with heritage enthusiasts.
- Supported our Executive Director in pursuing additional training on cultural tourism, non-violent crisis intervention, copyright law, and digital literacy.
- Embarked on a coaching project through the National Trust for Canada Launch Pad Coaching Grant to develop an improved fundraising program.

Leadership & Advocacy

Tourism Industry Association of the Yukon (TIA)

As a Designated Organization (DO), YHMA maintains a permanent seat on the TIA Yukon Board of Directors. Through this position, we continued to share the interests and concerns of the heritage community with the broader tourism sector and to play an important connecting role between these groups.

YHMA Vice President Sylvie Binette attended TIA Yukon's 2019 Fall Conference representing YHMA, while President Kaitlin Normandin continued to represent YHMA on the TIAY Board of Directors. In this role she supported early research and advocacy efforts led by TIAY in response to COVID-19.

National Conference and Meeting Attendance

YHMA Executive Director Lianne Maitland attended to the Canadian Museums Association (CMA) national conference, helping to maintain the profile of the Yukon's heritage and heritage sector as well as making new connections, collecting ideas and resources, and contributing to national heritage initiatives.

During the conference, Lianne attended a meeting with the national and provincial museum associations to discuss items of mutual interest. Topics discussed included the 2018 report of the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage regarding Canadian museums, and the response from the federal government, as well as advocacy during the federal election.

At this meeting, YHMA also joined other provincial and territorial museum associations in committing to support a research project led by the Alberta Museums Association to ensure the project is representative of the Yukon and Canada as a whole. This project will focus on the value of museums in society as perceived by the public, and on the development of advocacy tools based on this research.

Museums and Cultural Centres Roundtable

YHMA Vice President Sylvie Binette and Executive Director Lianne Maitland attended the Yukon Museums and Cultural Centres Roundtable hosted by the Museums Unit, Department of Tourism and Culture, Government of Yukon in November 2019 as observers.

The Roundtable provides Museums Unit clients the opportunity to come together to connect, discuss matters of mutual interest, and set shared goals.

Participating as an observer allows YHMA to stay connected with the museum community and apprised of current activities, issues, and initiatives.

Yukon Tourism Development Strategy

YHMA Executive Director Lianne Maitland held a seat on the Yukon Tourism Development Strategy (YTDS) Implementation Acting on behalf of membership and in partnership with heritage -related stakeholders, YHMA will advocate on significant and relevant heritage-

Committee, which formerly had the role of Steering Committee. The Implementation Committee advised the Department of Tourism & Culture on the development of the Terms of Reference for the new Yukon Tourism Advisory Board (YTAB), which replaced the YTDS in March 2020.

Klondike National Historic Sites Advisory Committee

YHMA Director Sally Robinson continued to represent YHMA on the Klondike National Historic Sites Advisory Committee. She attended two meetings over the course of the year, advocating for a protection-based approach to built heritage and for more attention to be given to the extensive artefact collection.

Creative and Cultural Industries Strategy

In May, YHMA Executive Director Lianne Maitland attended a public engagement session on the Creative and Cultural Industries Strategy to be developed by the Government of Yukon. As one of the few representatives in attendance working in heritage, Lianne helped to bring the perspective and needs of the sector into the conversation. The strategy is still in development.

Federal Election

YHMA worked with the Canadian Museums Association (CMA) and provincial museum associations to develop an infographic and clear messaging to communicate priority recommendations to support the museum sector for use during the federal election.

With support from the provincial and territorial museum association, including YHMA, the CMA sent letters with these recommendations to all party leaders, and followed up on the recommendations post-election with Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. The museum associations were pleased that a review of the national museum policy, one of our key recommendations, was included in Minster of Canadian Heritage Steven Guilbeault's mandate letter, and continue to advocate for this commitment to be fulfilled.

Museum Funding

Responding to a request from the museum community, YHMA shareed concerns regarding museum and cultural centre funding levels with Yukon Minister of Tourism and Culture Jeanie Dendys. Executive Director Lianne Maitland spoke with representatives from each Museum Unit client. YHMA then shared the results, including requests and recommendations, in a letter to the Minister.

In response, Minister Dendys met with YHMA and a selection of Museum Unit

client representatives to further discuss the matter. Although YHMA was not successful in securing additional funding at that time, we continue to advocate for both increased funding and an updated policy and strategy for Yukon museums and cultural centres.

MacBride Museum Tax Abatement

In response to the MacBride Museum of Yukon History's ongoing efforts to secure abatement for property taxes from the City of Whitehorse, YHMA issued a public statement of support and wrote a letter to Mayor and Council calling upon the City to grant MacBride Museum's request. The letter also highlighted the social and economic value the museum brings to the community.

Canadian Index of Wellbeing

YHMA Executive Director Lianne Maitland participated in a public engagement session to inform a Yukon-specific version of the Canadian Index of Wellbeing survey. She advocated for the inclusion of Yukon-relevant metrics related to heritage and culture as an essential part of a happy, healthy society.

Roundtable on Socio-Economic Impact Assessment of Indigenous Culture & Tourism Sectors

At the invitation of the Yukon First Nations Culture and Tourism Association, YHMA Executive Director Lianne Maitland attended a stakeholder roundtable to inform a socio-economic impact assessment of the Indigenous culture and tourism sectors.

COVID-19 Response

YHMA quickly took action when COVID-19 was declared a pandemic, liaising with the Museums Unit to clarify funding distribution and terms for museums and cultural centres, as well as cooperating with TIA Yukon to collect feedback on the impacts of COVID-19 on the heritage sector. YHMA then wrote to Yukon Minister of Tourism and Culture Jeanie Dendys, highlighting these impacts on and urging the department not to allow them to negatively affect current or future funding, which received a positive response from the Minister.

YHMA also collected and shared relevant resources through the e-bulletin.

Letters of Support

YHMA provided letters of support to a variety of Yukon heritage-related projects and organizations for funding applications.

Memberships

YHMA maintains paid or reciprocal memberships with a variety of other heritage-related organizations in the Yukon and nationally. These memberships help YHMA to stay up-to-date on important issues within Yukon and across the country, promote Yukon heritage, and make valuable connections.

YHMA will inspire a passion for heritage by raising awareness. YHMA will raise awareness both within and outside of the Yukon, and in doing so, we will encourage people to see history and heritage as fun, interesting and vibrant.

Education and Awareness

Yukon Heritage Training Fund

YHMA administers the Yukon Heritage Training Fund (YHTF), which supports opportunities for Yukon residents to increase their skills and knowledge in the

heritage sector. Between April 1, 2019 and March 31, 2020, over \$35,350 in funding was committed to 18 different training projects. 40 participants directly benefitted as participants in funded training projects.



YHTF is funded by the Government of Yukon Department of Education, Labour Post-Secondary and Labour Market unit. All training approved through this fund supports objectives to increase the employability of Yukon's heritage workers and provide Yukon heritage employers with a better-trained workforce.

YHMA is dedicated to leveraging the impact of YHTF to develop the capacity and long-term sustainability of the heritage sector. This is achieved by increasing the number of people with the skills necessary to obtain and maintain work in the heritage sector, increasing job satisfaction and labour market competitiveness, and by providing human resources that enable the Yukon to develop its heritage resources at a world-class, professional level.

Yukon/Stikine Regional Heritage Fair

The annual Heritage Fair is an educational initiative that encourages students to explore Canadian heritage in a dynamic and captivating learning environment. Students use the media of their choice to share their learning about Canadian heroes and legends, milestones and achievements in Canadian history, or their own family or community history, and then proudly present their research at a public exhibition.

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LA FÊTE RÉGIONALE DE PATRIMOINE Over 100 people gathered in the Yukon College gymnasium on May 2 for the 2019 edition of the YUKON/STIKINE Squill on Iviay 2 for the 2019 edition of the Fair. Participating students represented grades 4-7 and five different schools in the communities of **REGIONAL HERITAGE FAIR** Faro, Haines Junction, and Whitehorse. Together, 33 students shared 32 different projects with their peers, judges, and the public.

As part of our ongoing partnership with Yukon College, students also enjoyed fun, educational activities organized and delivered by College staff. These activities took place in various departments throughout the school, offering students the opportunity to explore the facilities and learn about available programs.

As usual, project topics were varied. Many students chose to pursue genealogical projects, exploring the lives of their ancestors. Others focused on topics related to the Yukon, including hand games, Moosehide, and Martha Black. Still others examined important national figures, historical events, and

inventions such as Elsie McGill, the Underground Railroad, and caller line identification.

In total, nine grade-specific awards, nice special awards, and three People's Choice awards were distributed to deserving projects.

The goals of the Fair include creating an engaging learning environment for students to strengthen their appreciation for Canadian heritage and developing students' roots in their communities and cultures to inspire them to participate in shaping Canada's future. The students' enthusiasm. creativity, and passion make heritage fairs a highlight of the school year.

Workshop on Non-Violent Crisis Intervention

YHMA arranged for Joshua Klassen of Yukon Government Social Services to teach a free, Non-Violent Crisis Intervention workshop for heritage sector workers, including seasonal staff, in late May. The Old Log Church Museum graciously donated space to host the workshop. In total, 18 participants from 6 different organizations completed this day-long workshop, including YHMA Executive Director Lianne Maitland and seasonal staff member Elisha Ida.

Culture Days

YHMA continued to hold a seat on the Culture Days Yukon steering committee, led by the Yukon Arts Centre. Culture Days is a nationwide festival that aims to foster appreciation, support of, and participation in the cultural lives of communities amongst all citizens through free or low-cost activities. Culture Days 2019 ran from September 27-29.

YHMA will support education and provide training opportunities for heritage professionals and non-professional members. In doing so, we will help encourage a deeper commitment to Yukon history and heritage and improve the tools and practices that are used in interpreting and conserving Yukon heritage.

YHMA partnered with the Old Log Church Museum to present a talk by John Firth, entitled "The Caribou Hotel and the Fine Art of History Finding the Writer." Throughout the weekend, members of the public also had the chance to participate in YHMA's second annual Heritage Highlights Scavenger Hunt, which encouraged participants to

explore downtown Whitehorse to discover interesting facts about heritage and answer the scavenger hunt questions.

Almost twice as many people participated in the scavenger hunt compared to 2018, and three lucky winners received prize packs made up of generous donations from Angelina's Toy Boutique, Baked Café, Coast Mountain Sports, Murdoch's Gem Shop, and Yukon Built.

Our Trails Bring Us Together / Haa deiyí wóoshxh haa ła.ât / Łäch'i tän kwaäga dūjal du Conference

From October 24-27, 2019, nearly two hundred people came together at the Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centre (KDCC) for the Our Trails Bring Us Together / Haa deiyí wóoshxh haa ła.ât / Łàch'i tän kwaäga dūjal du Conference. This conference marked the 150th anniversary of the Kohklux maps and explored both the Kohklux and Kandik maps as well as related topics.

Approximately 50 presenters led over 30 conference sessions. In addition to these sessions, two pre-conference learning events took place. Four local grade four classes visited the KDCC and participated in a series of activities focusing on the maps, led by Rhoda Merkel, Cathy Hines, Ellen Johnson, Linda Johnson,

and Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in Elder Gerald Isaac. In addition, 18 heritage professionals took a digital preservation workshop led by Ern Bieman of the Canadian Heritage Information Network.

On the Saturday evening, a public gala to celebrated the 150th anniversary of the Kohklux maps and the coming together of communities with a connection to both the

Kohklux and Kandik maps. Guests enjoyed a feast while taking in performances from four Indigenous performance groups from the territories represented on the maps.

Perhaps most notable was the loan of the original small Kohklux map and Kandik map from the Bancroft Library, University of California Berkeley. After

year-long negotiations, these maps arrived the week prior to the conference and went on display at the Da Ku Cultural Centre during Champagne and Aishihik

First Nations' (CAFN) Kohklux Map Potlatch. Following their trip to Haines Junction, the maps were installed at the KDCC and remained on display until the close of the conference.

Also on display was a special travelling exhibition on the Kohklux and Kandik Maps, prepared by YHMA and it partners to mark the anniversary and complement the conference. Consisting of pop-up banners and map reproductions, the exhibition is now available for loan.

This project was organized by a planning committee comprising representatives from YHMA, Jilkaat Kwaan Heritage Center (JKHC), KDCC, CAFN, Parks Canada, and Yukon Archives, as well as Elders, independent scholars, and other volunteers. Project partners included the JKHC and KDCC. Sponsors and funders included Yukon Government, Yukon Chamber of Mines, Association franco-yukonnaise, and Yukon Energy.

Initiatives such as conferences serve to strengthen our local heritage networks and ties outside the territory, as well as to encourage knowledge-sharing, new research, and new perspectives.

2019 Yukon Heritage Awards

February 17, 2020 saw a busy evening at the Yukon Archives, with over 50 guests coming out to attend the 2019 Annual Yukon Heritage Awards ceremony, coinciding with National Heritage Week.

Connecting with the Heritage Week theme, "Bringing the past into the future," guest speaker Dr. Laura Millar gave a rousing and inspiring address on archives and records in a digital age, encouraging listeners to start managing their own records to help ensure future archivists are not inundated with unnecessary and extraneous records.

Awards were presented to the following recipients:

 John Firth (Annual Heritage Award): A long-time Yukoner and born storyteller, John combines his passions for writing and Yukon history by capturing stories of interesting people, places, and events and sharing them in an entertaining style that is easy to read and enjoy. He is the sole author

Recognizing that everyone can have a role to play, YHMA will develop long-lasting, respectful and innovative partnerships for the promotion, protection and preservation of Yukon heritage.

of a number of books relating to Yukon heritage and has contributed to others, including the well-known Whitehorse: An Illustrated History and Yukon Sport: An Illustrated History. John's first book, released in 1990, was Yukon Challenge: the story of the Yukon Quest, later republished as Yukon Quest: The 1000-mile dog sled race through the Yukon and Alaska; in 1999, he was awarded the Yukon Commissioner's Award in recognition of his work to preserve Yukon dog mushing history and heritage. In addition to documenting Yukon heritage in his written works, John has also served as a member of the Yukon Heritage Resources Board.

- Helene Dobrowolsky and Rob Ingram (History Makers Award): Both Helene and Rob have been key contributors to the field of Yukon heritage since their arrival in the territory in the 1970s. Rob became the Government of Yukon's first Historic Sites employee in 1979, while Helene became the first Yukon Archives researcher in its present location at Yukon Place. Rob conducted the first historic sites inventory for the Yukon, and helped to develop the policy and procedures for nominating Yukon historic sites. As an oral history specialist, Helene has trained hundreds of people in the techniques and ethics of managing and carrying out oral history projects. Since 1988, Helene and Rob have worked in partnership as cultural and heritage resource consultants under their business name, Midnight Arts. Their work can be found in management and interpretive plans for Yukon historic sites, interpretative pamphlets and flyers for heritage places across the territory, online exhibitions, numerous books on Yukon heritage, and many other places.
- Lillian Nakamura Maguire (Helen Couch Volunteer of the Year Award): As a founding member of Hidden Histories Society Yukon, Lillian has, to date, dedicated eighteen years to the organization and its mandate to foster and increase the understanding of ethnocultural history in the Yukon. Through the contributions of Lillian and others. Hidden Histories conducts research. produces displays, and coordinates events that enlarge the representation of diverse individuals and

communities in the documentation and interpretation of Yukon history. Lillian's dedication to documenting, exploring, and sharing diverse stories has enriched both Hidden Histories Society Yukon, and the field of Yukon heritage as a whole.

 Gwaandak Theatre and Vuntut Gwitchin Government (Innovation, Education, and Community Engagement Award): Gwaandak Theatre and Vuntut Gwitchin Government's (VGG) multi-year, community-based project, Ndoo Tr'eedyaa Gogwaandak (Forward Together): Vuntut Gwitchin Stories, celebrates Gwich'in storytelling tradition and Indigenous language revitalization through the production of a series of radio plays. The plays are based on long-ago and contemporary Gwich'in stories from Old Crow, which speak to the vital relationship between people and land. A total of seven radio plays, three in Gwich'in and four in English, were developed with the active involvement of community members at all stages, from scriptwriting and translation to performance and production. The plays are available as podcasts and illustrated script booklets online at vuntutstories.ca and are free to download for the general public.
